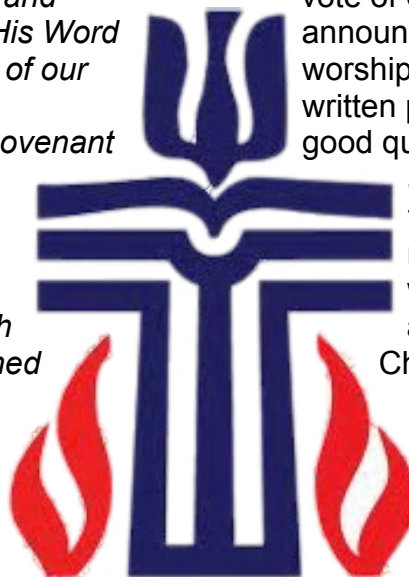
Dear Friends:

At its regular meeting at the end of August, your elected elders unanimously passed the following motion:

For reasons of faithfulness to Jesus Christ and submission to His Word as an essential of our faith, Session recommends Covenant Presbyterian Church seek dismissal from the PC(USA) and affiliate with another Reformed and Presbyterian body. Session will be diligent and prayerful

in seeking God's will with respect to that appropriate body.

Over the last month we have informed our members of this vote of Session through announce-ments at our worship services and in our written publications. Several good questions have been asked concerning this recommendation which I will briefly address here in the Chimes.

1. Why did the Session unanimously vote to make this recommendation?

Each elder would give you his or her unique personal response to this question, but the common and essential reason would be something like this: *The recent actions of our denomination, removing right, important and clear Biblical standards for the ordination of church leaders, is a rejection of the Church's essential belief in the truth and authority of God's Word, the Bible. Like thousands of other faithful members of our PC(USA) church family who have lovingly and boldly kept "fighting the good fight" and have stuck with our denomination despite its decades-long march toward cultural accommodation and away from Biblical orthodoxy, your elders have said that the decisions of 2011 have "crossed the line."*

PC(USA) churches are now put in a position of choosing either to be faithful to Jesus Christ our Lord or to be faithful to our denomination. And so the leaders you elected, without exception, voted to seek separation from our beloved denominational family because we must love Jesus Christ more. "As for us and our household, we will serve the Lord!"

2. Why didn't the Session wait to vote on this until after they had asked us (the congregation) what we thought?

I have two good answers to this: polity and integrity.

Polity – Your elders have been called, by God and by you, to lead. And so they are leading. It is appropriate for them to do so. Our polity also limits the power of our Session, and we understand and embrace this reality. The motion above is a *recommendation*, and it cannot be more than that. It is a recommended *direction to pursue*. It does not, by the authority of our church elders, suddenly make us something other than a PC(USA) church. This motion *begins a process* that will and must include our whole church membership and our Presbytery of Nevada. The action of being dismissed out of the PC(USA) and into another Reformed and Presbyterian organization will not happen unless and until it is owned and affirmed by our congregation as a whole and voted for

by a great majority of our members. In addition, such a dismissal will happen in cooperation with our Nevada Presbytery according to its "gracious dismissal" policy.

Integrity – The Session could have come to the congregation as a whole, presented their perspectives on the crisis and then asked, "What do you all think?" And if there was confusion or a lack of consensus on their part about these things, this might have been wise. But since they are in solid agreement about the course of action God is leading us to pursue, this might have been misleading or manipulative. The fact is, your leaders are of one mind concerning God's will for us in this matter: We cannot remain connected to, and under the authority of, a church that denies an essential of our faith. In its present state, the PC(USA) is in such a state, and so we have initiated a process in our church family and with our presbytery that moves us toward dismissal.

3. What will this process involve?

First we will schedule special times to come together as a church family to share our concerns, ideas, hopes and fears, to listen to one another, to ask questions, to seek God's will for His Covenant Church and to pray. Several such regular Covenant Family Meetings we hope and pray will help us to move together

faithfully in the way our Lord would have us go.

At the same time, your Session will continue exploring and researching other denominations that might provide the reformed, Presbyterian and Biblically faithful affiliation we are seeking.

In addition, the Moderator of our Presbytery will appoint a three-person "listening group" to meet with our leaders and our congregation, according to Presbytery's "gracious dismissal policy," to assess the nature and significance of our reasons for seeking dismissal and to see how reconciliation might be achieved.

4. How long will all this take?

We don't know. No one else has yet gone before us down this "gracious dismissal" road in our Presbytery. I anticipate that we should be ready to vote on our Session's recommendation by Easter of next year, but this is an educated guess. We won't go faster than seems fair and prudent, but our leadership is convinced that we need to keep moving and that a decision must be made concerning our future within or apart from the PC(USA) denomination.

HELP!

I Know I'm supposed to read my Bible but I just can't get into it.....

First, let's get one thing straight - Salvation does not come from reading your Bible. Only faith in Jesus Christ can do that. And, no... you don't even get "Brownie Points" for doing it. But what you will get is a changed life and the chance to see the heart and mind of God in a fresh and personal way. The following are some tips that we have found useful for making Bible reading a part of our daily lives.

➔ Be Choosy

Choose a translation that works for you. There are many translations to choose from - New International Version (NIV), English Standard Version (ESV) and Contemporary English Version (CEV), just to name a few. Some are in contemporary English and are easy to read and understand. Ask your pastor, an Elder, or a Sunday School teacher for recommendations.

➔ Get the notes

Choose a study Bible that has footnotes with comments that will help you to understand what you are reading.

➔ Plan ahead

A reading plan will give you some direction and help you

to stay on track. Choose a reading plan that works for you. There are many, many different reading plans available. Some plans give reading assignments from the Old Testament, New Testament, Psalms, and Proverbs each day. Other plans take you through the Bible in Chronological order. Dated and Undated Reading Plans are available on [Covenant's website](http://www.bibleplan.org) or from <http://www.bibleplan.org>.

➔ Pray About It

Before you start to read, pray. Ask God to help you to focus, to understand what you read and to find personal application for your life.

➔ Stick to It!

OK, Let's be honest here. There are some chapters, even books of the Bible that are "less interesting" than

others. You may be tempted to throw in the towel after reading long lists of numbers, genealogies or pages dealing with more than you ever wanted to know about mildew. Keep reading. It gets better. These sections are in the Bible for a reason. Ask God to help you figure out that reason. Your pastor can probably help here too!

➔ Dig In!

Don't just read the Bible - study it. Dig into your Bible reading and get all the information out of it that you can. Learn how to study your Bible by attending the "Mining God's Word" Sunday School Class currently being taught by Chris Rhodes. Or, for self study try out "Lord Teach Me To Study The Bible in 28 Days" by Kay Arthur, or "A Place of Quiet Rest" by Nancy Leigh DeMoss.



Reward yourself

Put a star on your calendar for each day that you read. You'll be amazed by your "stick-to-it-ness" when you have a visual record.



Get a Bible buddy

Research has shown that those who enlist a friend lose more weight and exercise more. The same can be said of Bible Reading. Challenge a friend to read with you or join a Small Group or Bible Study where you can discuss what you're reading.



Grab a Pen

Read your Bible with a pen and Journal or notebook in hand. Take notes while you read. Write comments. Write down questions that you want to ask your pastor about.

Forget what you're Kindergarten teacher said about writing in books. It is OK to write in your Bible. If your conscience still won't

allow you to write in books you can always make a photocopy or print out a copy of the text you are studying and make notes on the copy.



Make it a Family Affair

Get your kids into the Bible too. Why not read a chapter each night at the dinner table or at bedtime.



Schedule it

Make an appointment with God everyday to read the Bible and keep it. We routinely carve out time for other things - a favorite TV show, going to the gym, or coffee with friends. We eat everyday to keep our bodies nourished. Likewise we need to feed our heart and mind each day to keep our spirit strong and healthy.



Tie it Together

Tie your Bible Reading time in with something that you

love to do or routinely do. Grab your favorite beverage to sip while you study. Or, don't allow yourself to eat breakfast, check e-mail, watch TV, etc until you have finished your Bible Reading.



Go Digital

Try out an electronic version of the Bible. Bible Reading Apps are available for I-Phone I-Pod, I-Pad, etc. Many are free. Since most people carry these devices with them all the time, Bible Reading can be fit into small "snatches" of time while you wait in a waiting room, stand in a check out line or waiting to pick you kids up from school.



Be Amazed

Just do it and watch how the Bible comes to life for you. You will be amazed at how God will speak to you through Scripture about things that are going on in your life .✝

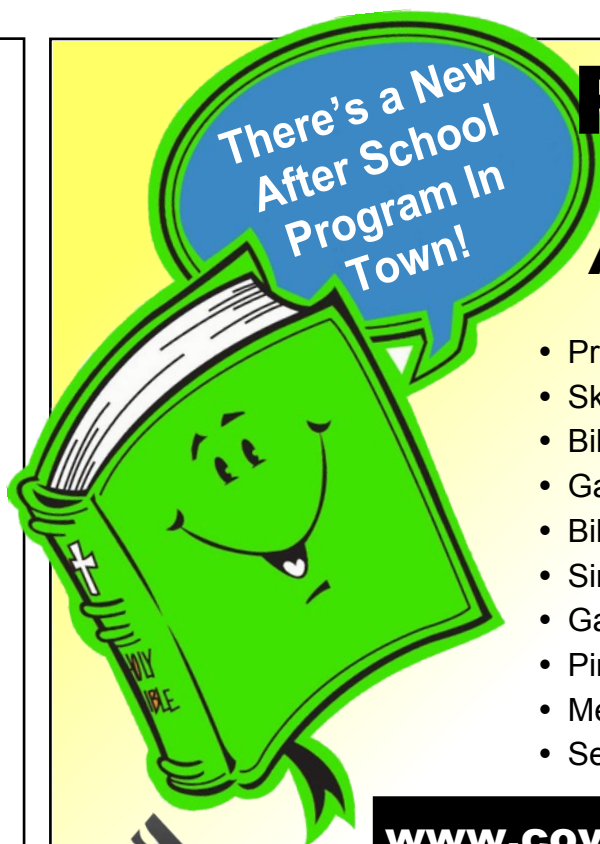

Harvest Loaf

Cake:

- 1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 1/2 tsp salt
- 3/4 tsp ground nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp ground ginger
- 1/2 tsp ground cloves
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup white sugar
- 2 eggs
- 3/4 cup Canned pumpkin
- 3/4 cup butterscotch Chips
- 3/4 cup chopped walnuts

Glaze:

- 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 2 Tbs heavy cream or milk



1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease and flour a 9x5 inch loaf pan. In a medium bowl, mix flour, soda, salt, 3/4 teaspoon nutmeg, ginger and cloves. Set aside.
2. In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs. Add flour mixture alternately with pumpkin. Stir in butterscotch chips and 1/2 cup of the walnuts. Pour batter into loaf pan. Sprinkle remaining nuts on top.
3. Bake at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) for 65 to 70 minutes or until toothpick inserted into center of cake comes out clean. Cool for 6 hours before serving. Drizzle with glaze.
4. To make the glaze: In a medium bowl, combine confectioners sugar, nutmeg and cinnamon. Mix and add 1 to 2 teaspoons cream until drizzling consistency
